The Global Scale of English Teacher Toolkit is a free, online database that brings together learning objectives, grammar and vocabulary in one place, all mapped to the GSE and CEFR.

Access to over **2,000 Learning Objectives**, **450 Grammar Objectives**, **39,000 Vocabulary word meanings** and more than **200 job profiles**.

How to use it

Choose the **type of student** and **type of English** you're interested in and then use **the GSE/CEFR slider to select the right level**.

The toolkit's functionality makes it quick and easy to **search for the most level-appropriate content** to support your lessons or use it to adapt your curriculum to meet the needs of your students.


